Hello! I'm Dana Hargrove, a Scottish artist who has found a home in the strange but wonderful landscapes of Florida, USA. I'm especially captivated by the complexities of simulacra, where

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the boundaries between reality and representation blur, turning landscape into a cultural product. 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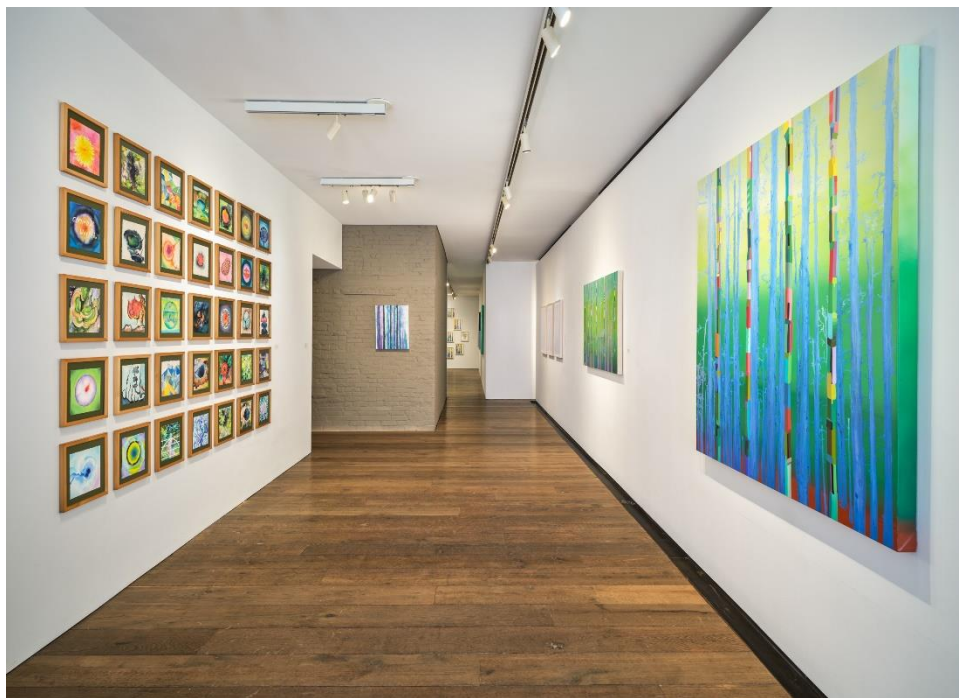
## We'd love to hear a story of resilience from your journey.

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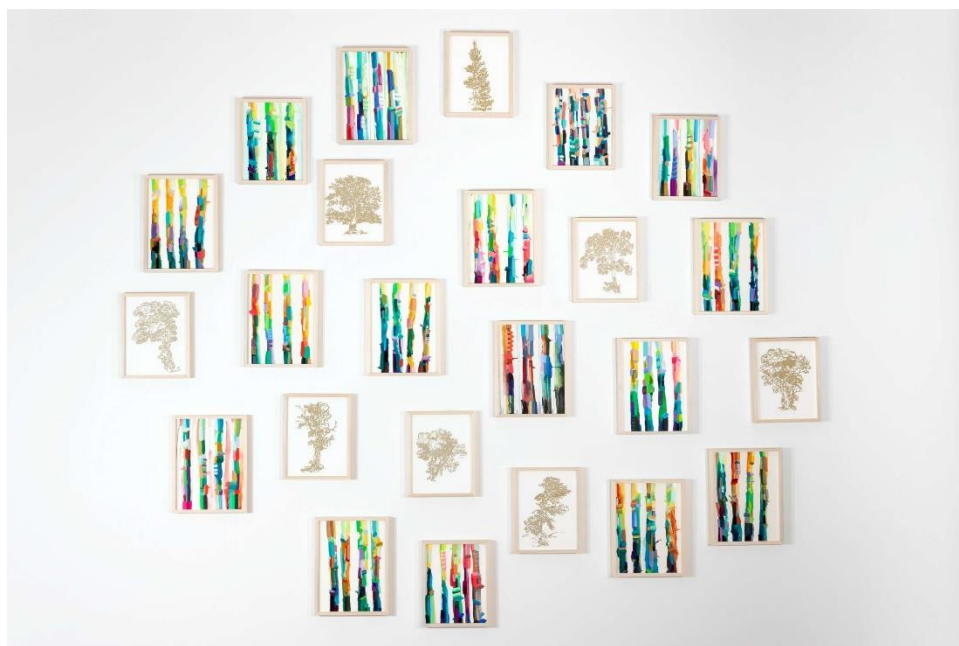
purposeful outlet, allowing me to contribute my thoughts to society and reshape my frustrations about our relationship with the land and environment.
